# Partners identify resources for landowners in the path of marsh migration

With guidance from the Environmental Law Institute (ELI), the state of Delaware is developing outreach strategies to help concentrate efforts and funding around hot spots for marsh migration to minimize impacts on coastal communities and agricultural producers. The effort is a pilot project for a new inventory of wetland prioritization practices developed by ELI and the Mid-Atlantic Regional Council on the Ocean (MARCO) with Hurricane Sandy funding coordinated by the North Atlantic LCC.

## Bird's-eye-view reveals priority habitat for threatened shorebirds

A new inventory of modifications to beach and tidal-inlet habitats from Maine to Virginia created using imagery from Google Earth, state agencies, and nongovernental organizations has provided valuable perspective on the condition and availability of habitat for the red knot and piping plover. With a bird's-eye-view of the coast, scientists have discovered that Little Egg Inlet in New Jersey is a rarer natural asset than they realized.

# Prime Hook National Wildlife Refuge wins 2017 Best Restored Beach award (ASBPA)

A project completed last fall to repair a barrier beach and dredge historic saltmarsh at Prime Hook National Wildlife Refuge in the wake of Hurricane Sandy has received a Best Restored Beach award from the American Shore & Beach Preservation Association. Nearly 8,000 feet of shoreline were restored in the two-year project, and several obsolete water-control structures were been removed to allow natural tidal flow.
